





Art: Design and make a Viking longship or paint a longship at sea. Learn the parts labelled in the picture.

The Vikings were superb sailors. Viking longships were used in battle and were long, light and slender so they could move around quickly. They had a square sail and a mast but could also be rowed if there was no wind. Sails were sometimes quilted in stripes or a diamond pattern, or dyed blood red. Depending on its size, a longship had 24 to 50 oars. The prow at the front of the ship was often adorned with a dragon or snakehead. Small boats were sometimes carried on board the larger boats to row ashore

for exploring without risking the main ship.

To make the longship: You can use carboard for the boat and dragonhead and paper for the mast. Straws, lollypop sticks, string can be used to hold up the sail.



Alternatively, you can draw a longship at sea and paint the scene.
